- Extend the opportunities for children outside the school day, including holidays

Challenges

1	Some children entering Reception class have poor S&L development
2	PP children still need to close attainment gap with non PP children in M,R,W
3	Phonics intervention is needed for the bottom 20% those PP who are not on track to meet the phonics screening standard and those that have not met standard
4	Childrens mental health and wellbeing being continues to be a challenge post Covid and cost of living crisis

Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2022 to 2023 academic year.

Evidence in summer 2 data shows children who were PP are catching up with non PP but not quick enough. The gap needs to close further, particularly with writing and phonics. It would appear current scheme not effective for all. New one required for Sept 2023.

Further information (optional)

- During the summer holidays the school received funding from the LA to offer full time holiday clubs with a focus on sport and nutrition. The was offered to Pupil Premium children. We had on average 30 each day.
- From September 2021 school will run an evening club based on sports 5-6pm KS1 and 6-7pm KS2.
